



Whilst I work mostly in isolation, writing, designing charts and keeping the website up-todate, I find it very helpful to belong to several groups where members can share their thoughts and bounce ideas off each other.

Groups also provide a support network to people confined to their homes through illness, disability, isolated locations, or through difficult family circumstances.

Talking to other people either directly or through the internet can often help to remove the feeling of isolation that so often occurs, especially if people live on their own and support from their families and others may be remote.

Belonging to a group such as the Embroiderers Guild in the UK, or a virtual group via the internet can have numerous benefits and is well worthy of consideration.

'Save the Stitches'

Size of the embroidered area: 15 x 31inches on 25 count Lugana

This will vary depending on the fabric you have used. If you used a piece 20 x 37 inches there will be sufficient to add a border if desired.

The time has come to bring this year long project to an end, although I know that there are many groups who will be starting their group projects in January.

I would like to say what a pleasure it has been to work with you all throughout the last year and to share in your e-mails and photographs. I know that there are many projects still being completed and I look forward to receiving the photographs of work in progress throughout 2015.








Work in progress at Lakeshore

Moving away from a set piece and implementing your own thoughts is an important step in your own development, rather than just following the design to the letter and I would encourage and applaud this thinking.












Block 22 Embroidery

Block 24 Embroidery – the final piece!

In Block 24, areas have been left empty for you to personalise the work by adding your initials, date and title. An alphabet sheet has been provided in Freebies to help you, but you will need to work the details out on a piece of graph paper before you start stitching so that the characters can be placed accurately.

The Final Touches

'Save the Stitches' has travelled round the world rolled up in a suitcase so in January I am going to decide how I finish the embroidery off and how I am going to mount it.

I have been designing some borders which I think might be suitable to work round the edge but for the moment I am going to put it to one side and consider what I am going to do.

I will post the borders in January 2015.

New Charts

A number of new designs are already in the pipeline, including a special new free project which will be starting in March 2015.



Designed for embroiderers new to blackwork, or for those just wanting to work small samples - this would be the ideal chart!

CH0331 Ribbons is included in Charts for this month as a simple Christmas gift, or by changing the colours, a ring pillow, and a frame with a monogram in the centre – a practical addition to the library
