An unusual autumn colour combination is just one of many variations underway by members of the Bolton Stitch and Textile Group.



Block 4 & 4a Simple Stitches




This block does contain some specialist stitches which appear difficult at first such as **Montenegrin Stitch** which is a form of cross stitch. It consists of one long diagonal stitch, crossed by a short diagonal stitch, a short vertical stitch and then by another short diagonal stitch.



Montenegrin Stitch

To work this stitch step by step follow the RSN Stitch Bank; https://rsnstitchbank.org/stitch/montenegrin-stitch

Always practise new stitches on a spare piece of fabric first before adding them to the band sampler. Once you are comfortable working the different stitches they can be used in other projects. For example, patterns taken from Blocks 1 - 4 have been used to make an i-pad case as shown below.






I-Pad cover Front

- 1. Fly stitch
- 2. Diamond straight stitches
- 3. Running stitch
- 4. Wheatear stitch
- 5. Leviathan and star stitches
- 6. Four-sided stitch border.

Joining stitch: Herringbone


Based on stitches from Blocks 1-3 in 'Stitch Along 2025' the i-pad cover is worked on Zweigart 14 count Aida using two pieces 14 x 10 inches. Lining fabric - cotton, 14 x 10 inches. Threads: Cotton Perle No 8 or matt crochet cotton. One skein of DMC floss for four-sided stitch.

Stitches: Herringbone. Algerian eye. Herringbone stitch has been used to join the two pieces of fabric together.

Star of the month - Doreen

Doreen, who is a member of one of the groups with which I am involved, wanted to make a special embroidered wedding present for her granddaughter. She had clear ideas about the colours she wanted to use and the shape of the embroidery but was uncertain where and how to start

A simple bouquet was sketched onto medium weight pink cotton. Doreen collected a selection of threads and embroidered the basic design in simple outline stitches - Lazy daisy and fly stitch leaves, straight stitches and Colonial knots. Bugle beads were added to some of the leaves for texture and sparkle.

To create the 3D effect lace leaves, wired net flowers and pink nylon flowers with beaded centres were applied. Sequins and beads over knots in circles added a different effect.

A cream box frame was used to mount the embroidery.

A beautiful gift from a proud granny!



PR0083 Exploring Stitches embroidery



Block 4. Cross stitch variations.

Block 4 is embroidered in greens and reds or colours of choice. **Threads:** Two shades of green plus 2 shades of red and silver beads. Tapestry needle No.24. The basic stitch is stitched in varied sizes and embellished. Experiment with threads, thicknesses, and colours to create a unique piece.




Block 4 numbered.



Block 4 Embroidery

Instructions: Leave 2 rows between Block 3 and Block 4. Cross stitch – 2 strands of floss

- **Band 24.** Narrow cross stitch over 2 x 1 block. **Band 25.** Cross stitch over 4 blocks using 2 strands of floss.
- Band 26. Traditional cross stitch flower motif worked in two strands of floss over I block.
- **Band 27**. Tied cross over 3 x 2 blocks. Embellishment Colonial knots or beads between each cross.
- Band 28. Montenegrin stitch. Follow diagram carefully!




Band 29a and 29a. stretched over 6 and 6a over 3 blocks.

Band 30. Open, expanded and embellished with beads and 'tied'.


Band 31. Simple flowers.

Band 32. Cross stitch zig zag pattern completes Block 4.





Cross stitch expanded.

Cross stitch variations - 2 strands

Row 1. Cross stitch over 2 x 2 blocks.

Row 2. Cross stitch flowers.

Row 3. Straight stitches tied and Colonial knots (4 strands).
Row 4. Montenegrin stitch over 4 x 2


Row 4. Montenegrin stitch over 4 x 2 blocks.

Row 5. Tied cross stitch.

Row 6. Cross stitch stretched over 6 x 6 blocks and 6a over 3 blocks.

Row 7. Open, expanded and embellished with beads and 'tied'

Colonial knot






Block 4 & 4a Simple Stitches



Use the pictures to look in detail at the stitches to see how they appear on the fabric. Consider what colours you use and the impact they make. Knots or beads add texture and interest. Colonial knots are compact and stable. The more threads used the heavier the knot will be. On 14 count Aida use four strands of floss.

Many stitches can be 'tied' with an alternative colour as shown in the embroideries above.



Herringbone stitch tied is used in later blocks.
